

New Faces


2019 was a year of growth at Powers. We had a number of new faces join the firm, strengthening and expanding our diverse team of professionals.

Both came to the firm with more than 20 years of experience advocating in Congress for healthcare and other clients. At Powers, they continue to work with elected officials and federal agencies to accomplish their clients' legislative and regulatory goals.

In September, we welcomed Natalie Dobek and Ryan Spraker to the firm. Natalie is an Associate in the healthcare practice and Ryan is an Associate in the education practice. Both were previously summer associates with the firm.

Mark Ogunsusi joined our healthcare practice as an Associate in October. Mark works primarily in the 340B Program and drug pricing practice group. He is also a doctor of pharmacy and, prior to joining Powers, he worked as a Pharmacist for CVS.

Finally, Kathleen Hatfield joined the firm's government relations practice as Senior Counsel in December 2019. Kathleen provides policy guidance, legislative, regulatory, and legal advice for corporations and non-profit organizations, including healthcare facilities and cultural entities.

CLIENT SUCCESSES

Our attorneys and professionals continued their tradition of top-level client service in 2019. This past year, we had a number of significant client successes, just a few of which we share below.

Principals Peter Thomas and Ron Connelly negotiated a global settlement of inpatient rehabilitation facility Medicare appeals. The settlement was negotiated on behalf of the Fund for Access to Inpatient Rehabilitation (FAIR), the American Medical Rehabilitation Providers Association (AMRPA), and the Federation of American Hospitals (FAH).

In August, Principal Larry Gondelman obtained a dismissal of a complaint on behalf of his client, a third-party financial aid servicer that was alleged to have assisted an educational institution in violating the False Claims Act regarding Title IV funds. Powers Principal Bill von Oehsen coauthored a report for the North Carolina Legislature that led directly to the passage of new legislation. The report outlined a proposal for a correctional partnership through which drugs purchased under the federal 340B drug pricing program could be used for the North Carolina prison population. The Inmate Health Care & 340B Program (H106) was passed into law as a result.

In September, more than 370 patient and provider organizations endorsed legislation that would reform prior authorization requirements in Medicare Advantage, a bill that Powers Principals Peggy Tighe and Diane Millman helped draft and advance through their work with the Regulatory Relief Coalition (RRC).

In November, CMS pulled back and chose not to reduce Medicare reimbursement for EEG testing, a significant win for Julie Allen and her client the Ambulatory EEG Coalition.

EVENTS AND SPEAKING

Powers professionals are routinely invited to attend and speak at some of the top conferences in their fields. Below, we share some of the highlights from this past year.

Principals Bill von Oehsen and Barbara Williams spoke at the 340B Coalition Winter Conference in February. Bill spoke on third party billing and reimbursement, while Barbara spoke on Medicare provider-based rules and their implications for 340B child site registration. Our 340B attorneys also participated in the Covered Entities 340B Summit, the Healthcare Compliance Association Conference, the 340B Coalition Summer Conference, the inaugural RWC-340B Conference, and many more.

In June, Ben Tesdahl, Counsel in the healthcare practice, hosted a webinar for association management company executives on common legal pitfalls faced by association management companies when managing nonprofit organizations.

Dan Brozovic and Nick Michiels in the education practice presented at the Central States Private Education Network (CSPEN) Annual Conference on the U.S. Department of Education's state authorization rule.

Peggy Tighe, a Principal in the government relations practice, spoke at various events for the American Association of Kidney Patients (AAKP), including the Global Innovations in Patient-Centered Kidney Care Summit and the National Patient meeting, where she discussed recent drug pricing bills and her work on legislation that would increase transparency in the processes used for prior authorization.

FIRM RECOGNITION

As in previous years, Powers was ranked in the top legal guides, such as Super Lawyers, Best Lawyers, and U.S. News and World Report:

MEMORANDA AND INSIGHTS

In 2019, Powers continued to be a source of insight into the complex legal and regulatory landscape in Washington. Our professionals published a number of blog posts and memoranda to guide their clients and others through new rules and regulations throughout the year.

In January, Principal Barbara Williams published a memorandum on CMS's revised guidance on hospital price transparency requirements.

Principal Mark Fitzgerald and Associate Megan La Suer summarized a proposed rule released by HHS in January to address the rising cost of prescription drugs.

Our healthcare practice issued a memorandum summarizing key aspects of key endstage renal disease (ESRD) provisions in a new proposed rule issued by CMS in July.

In March, our 340B practice released a memoranum on the current legal and regulatory landscape surrounding 340B overcharges and what steps covered entities can take to recover those overcharges.

In the fall, the education practice published a series of blogs summarizing the Department of Education's final regulations on accreditation and state authorization. The blogs discuss how the new rule eases the process for new accrediting agencies seeking recognition and summarize the key changes to state authorization, among other things.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

In 2019, we continued to find ways to connect with our community and support local nonprofits.

Attorneys Becky Burke, Larry Gondelman, Diane Millman, and Rob Portman continued their tradition of supporting the EverybodyWinsDC reading program at the Marie Reed Elementary School in Adams Morgan. Powers also donates annually to EverybodyWinsDC.

A group of attorneys participated in the Everybody Wins Trivia Contest with over 90 members of the legal community.
